For many LGBT* individuals, growing up in a religious tradition is a mixed blessing. A faith can instill spirituality, ethics and charity. It can also inspire shame, self-loathing and insecurity. All too often, members of the LGBT community have come away with the latter, forcing them to dramatically re-evaluate their identity when they are mature enough to do so. Fortunately, many LGBT persons are able to make this transition and are stronger for it. But for young people, it robs them of the self-confidence that should be part of their formative years.

As members of a progressive union, we often look to community allies in working toward social justice. Indeed, many religious organizations do incredible social work in their communities. HEU members can assist these groups, work within our own faith-based organization, or find allies for social justice. HEU members can also bring their sense of fairness, openness, tolerance – *acceptance* – and share it with others during the holidays and throughout the year.

So, this year, I want to give my mother a definite "no" to attending church on Christmas Eve. I always feel like the odd man out. However, my partner, who grew up in the same religious tradition and is definitely more spiritual than me, is suddenly saying that he wants to go.

International Day Against Homophobia: why it's important

As Thom Marshall discussed in his co-chair report, the LGSC will be participating in the 2008 International Day Against Homophobia (IDAH) campaign. While the actual day — May 17 — is several months away, the issues it will highlight are ongoing.

Each year, the Fondation Émergence, the agency behind the IDAH, identifies a theme for its campaign. The 2008

focus will be addressing homophobia in the health care field.

The Fondation Émergence has identified four areas in health care that need more awareness:

Participants in the health care field: health professionals and those providing service must be aware of LGBT realities and needs in order to provide proper

Mental health and suicide: As I mentioned in my editorial, LGBT individuals often go through a difficult period of adapting to their sexual orientation. As with many young people going through an identity crisis, this is a critical time when thoughts of suicide, or suicide attempts, occur if individuals have difficulty coping.

Procreation: Methods of procreation must be free of discrimination and accessible to the LGBT community.

Aging: The first generation of LGBT persons, who have primarily been able to live their lives openly gay, are now becoming senior citizens. For those accessing seniors' centres or residing in care homes, they need to be free of judgment and be provided with a safe retirement situation. It is inconceivable that they should have to go back in the closet after living proud lives.

The LGSC is excited about the 2008

focus on health, and is working on a number of initiatives as a lead up to the May 17 International Day Against Homophobia.

First, the LGSC has developed a logo for use in HEU's campaign against homophobia. We are also working on publishing pamphlets in conjunction with the LGBT Vancouver Centre on health matters for various constituencies of the LGBT community.

As well, we are reviewing the policies in health agencies as they relate to the LGBT community in an effort to develop educational material that will hopefully provide awareness, understanding and respect in health care delivery to the LGBT community.

I encourage all HEU members to watch for our initiatives, and to actively develop an awareness of diversity (in its many forms) in your workplace providing leadership and fostering respect.
